## Mini Lesson 017 - The Present Simple for Permanent Situations

## **Explanation:**

The present simple tense is primarily used to describe permanent situations. These are situations or states that exist over a long period and are expected to continue indefinitely.

**Permanent Situations** refer to conditions or facts that cross the present moment and are not temporary. We use the present simple to describe:

- 1. **General Statements and Universal Truths:** Facts that are always true, such as scientific or mathematical truths.
  - Example: "Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius."
- 2. **Long-term Personal Situations:** Conditions in our lives that have been consistent over time and are expected to remain unchanged for the foreseeable future.
  - Example: "She works as a doctor."
- 3. **Habitual Actions:** Actions that are repeated regularly and have become part of a routine.
  - Example: "He goes jogging every morning."
- 4. **Stative Verbs for Temporary States:** Stative verbs can also be used in the present simple to describe states that are current but may not last long. Unlike dynamic verbs, which describe actions, stative verbs describe a state of being.
  - **Example:** "She loves chocolate." (Stative verb)
  - **Example:** "He feels tired." (Temporary state)

Remember, the present simple is not used for actions that are happening right now; for those, we use the present continuous tense.
