



Mini Lesson 023 - Making Polite Requests with 'Could' and 'Would'

When making requests in English, using **'could'** and **'would'** helps to express politeness. These modal verbs make the request sound softer and more considerate.

Using 'Could':

- **'Could you...?'** is often used to ask someone to do something.
 - Example: *Could you open the window, please?*
- It suggests that the person has the ability or option to help.
 - Example: *Could you lend me your pen?*

Using 'Would':

- **'Would you...?'** is slightly more polite and formal than 'Could you...?'.
 - Example: *Would you mind passing the salt?*
- It often implies that the request is more a matter of willingness than ability.
 - Example: *Would you help me with this project?*

Additional Polite Expressions:

- **'Would you mind...?'**
 - Example: *Would you mind closing the door?*
- **'Could I...?'** for requests related to yourself.
 - Example: *Could I borrow your book?*

Response to Requests:

- **Yes, of course.**
- **Sure, no problem.**
- **I'm sorry, but...** (if you can't fulfill the request)
