



Mini Lesson 067 - The Difference Between 'Each' and 'Every'

Understanding the difference between 'each' and 'every' is important for clear communication in English. Both are used to refer to individual items in a group, but they have slightly different meanings and uses.

'Each' refers to individual items separately, usually indicating a smaller, defined group. It emphasizes individuality and is often used when talking about two or more items.

Examples:

- Each student received a certificate.
- Each of the apples is fresh and delicious.

'Every' refers to all items in a group as a whole and emphasizes the entire collection. It's used when referring to a larger group and requires at least three items. 'Every' often implies a repetition over time.

Examples:

- Every student in the school must wear a uniform.
- Every day, she takes a walk in the park.

Common Mistakes:

- Incorrect: Every of the students was present.
- Correct: Each of the students was present.
