

Mini Lesson 095 - Expressing Obligation with 'Have to' and 'Must'

In English, we use 'have to' and 'must' to express obligation or necessity. Although both expressions convey a sense of requirement, they are used in slightly different contexts.

When to use 'Must':

- To express a strong obligation or necessity:
- Example: You must wear a seatbelt while driving.
- To give strong advice or recommendations:
- Example: You must try the chocolate cake; it's delicious!

When to use 'Have to':

- To express an obligation that comes from an external source:
- Example: I have to finish my homework before going out.
- To indicate something that is necessary but not as strong as 'must':
- Example: You have to pay for your ticket before entering the concert.

Structure:

- Affirmative: Subject + must/have to + base form of the verb
- Example: She must attend the meeting.
- Negative: Subject + must not (mustn't)/do not have to + base form of the verb
- Example: You mustn't run in the hallways.
- Example: You don't have to bring your own lunch.
- Questions: Must/Do + subject + base form of the verb?
- Example: Must we leave now?
- Example: Do you have to go so soon?
