

Mini Lesson 101 - Expressing Degrees of Certainty with 'Surely', 'Definitely', 'Probably'

Understanding how to express degrees of certainty is important for clear communication. The words 'surely', 'definitely', and 'probably' help us convey how confident we are about something happening.

- **Surely**: This word expresses a high level of certainty. It means that you are very confident about something.

Example: Surely, it will rain tomorrow.

- **Definitely**: This word also shows a strong level of certainty, indicating that something is unequivocally true or will happen.

Example: I will definitely go to the party.

- **Probably**: This word indicates a moderate level of certainty. It suggests that something is likely to happen, but it's not guaranteed.

Example: She will probably come to the meeting.

How to use these words:

- Use 'surely' to express strong assurance.
- Use 'definitely' to confirm something with certainty.
- Use 'probably' when you think something is likely, but not certain.
